Good Food Nation Bill No commitment to a bill, instead Conservatives have committed to: launch a comprehensive 'farm to fork' review of Scotland's food policy

Good Food Nation Bill that establishes an integrated food policy, tackling the health, social and environmental impacts of the food system

Will deliver a comprehensive Good Food Nation Act based on proposals by the Scottish Food Coalition Commitment to consult on a Good Food Nation Bill to bring together reforms needed As part of a Good Food Nation Bill we will create a single independent Scottish Food agency

Enshrining the Right to Food into Scottish Law

The Good Food Nation Bill will enshrine the Right to Food in Scots law

Committed to ensuring the Right to Food is included in legislation Will use the Good Food Nation Bill to create a right to food, with crossgovernmental work to end the need for food banks Enshrine the Right to Food in law as a key part of our ambition to be a Good Food Nation

Establish a Statutory Food Commission

Review of food policy to be led by an independent figure and report in Summer 2022 Statutory Food Commission, charged with a duty to ensure the right to food is maintained and that decisions in areas such as health, planning and education contribute towards a positive food environment No direct mention of a Scottish Food Commission - however Labour has noted that they are in line with the Scottish Food Coalition Scottish Food Agency to promote food, drink and horticulture, attract investment and help increase the processing capacity and improve supply chain infrastructure

National Food Plan that works across the whole food system The Good Food Nation Bill will oblige Scottish Government to deliver a statutory National Food Plan

Commitment to National Food Plan as part of legislation Stay aligned to EU's Farm to Fork Strategy while transforming support for farming and food production in Scotland

Pivot towards Local Food & Shorter supply chains Encourage public services, businesses and individuals to buy more local products.

Ensure public procurement utilises Scottish produce wherever possible Establish a local food development fund. Use public procurement contracts to support local sustainable food producers Rethink supply chains for food, returning to a more localised system of production Scotland-first procurement policy.

Commitment to help food producers and processors navigate the tendering processes so they can seek out opportunities to secure procurement contracts Produce a local food strategy which supports locally based production and circular supply chains, cutting food miles and enabling more people to enjoy food grown locally.

£15 million fund to support food processing and manufacture to develop local supply chains and transition to low or zero carbon emissions.
